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## **Caring for Creation: Workshops help congregations, households develop five-year plan for reducing carbon footprint**

Individuals, congregations and businesses can learn how to reduce their carbon footprint and energy costs at two workshops—one for congregations (12 to 2:30 p.m.) and one for households (6:30 to 8:30 p.m.)—on Monday, April 23. Sponsored by Oregon Interfaith Power and Light (OIPL), Oregon Department of Energy and Energy Trust of Oregon, the workshops will be held at St. Luke Lutheran Church, 6835 SW 46<sup>th</sup> Ave., Portland.

The workshops will provide consumers with tools—including a five year plan to dramatically reduce carbon footprints—and know-how to increase energy efficiency and use renewable energy. “Scientists say we have less than 10 years to stabilize carbon emissions to prevent the worst effects of global warming,” says Jenny Holmes, Environmental Ministries director for Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon. “Although major policy changes are needed, OIPL offers these workshops because everyone can be a part of the solution of global warming and lead by example. No step is too small.”

The first workshop, “Save Your Congregation Energy and Money,” will be held **from 12 to 2:30 p.m.** Geared to the needs of congregations, the workshop will cover key principles of energy stewardship for congregations, low-cost and no-cost measures to save energy costs, and funding energy efficiency projects for religious facilities. The second workshop, “Energy Stewardship,” will be offered for individuals **from 6 to 8:30 p.m.** Topics will include top ideas to save energy costs for homes and businesses, affordable renewable energy options and the ethics of energy stewardship.

Keynote speaker for both workshops is Doug Boleyn, who has over 30 years of experience in renewable energy and energy efficiency and is energy consultant for OIPL, board member of the Solar Energy Association of Oregon, president of Cascade Solar Consulting, LLC, and a member of the Energy Trust of Oregon Renewable Advisory Committee. Case study speakers for the afternoon session are Sr. Pat Nagle, who will share about a major green remodel of her religious order's motherhouse, and Eric Canon, who will

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address the spiritual and material benefits of his congregation's major energy efficiency upgrades. Other speakers include Jan Schaeffer and Will Miller of the Energy Trust of Oregon, and Roland Gilchrist from the Oregon Department of Energy. For the evening session there will be a success story from Alan Scott, a Brooklyn Neighborhood homeowner who has dramatically reduced the environmental footprint of his home. The Rev. David Knapp, pastor of St. Luke Lutheran Church, will give an opening reflection on faith and care of creation at both workshops.

Registration will be accepted at the door. Cost of registration per workshop is \$8 per individual, and, if registering at the same time, \$12 total for two people, or \$17 total for three.
